

Choice of Maternity Delivery Location

From a survey of 562 mothers carried out in April 2017 by the Oswestry Maternity Group we decided it would be useful to look at the current choices that expectant mothers make about the preferred location of delivery compared to the actual location of delivery. To do this several parameters were set into the data:

- The delivery was in the preceding 12 months, i.e. post April 2016, this was to get a picture of the current situation.
- The choice of delivery was within Shropshire and Telford & Wrekin



• Data was only used from respondents who have only had 1 delivery. This was to reduce the 'noise' generated by question answers giving information on more than one of the respondents delivery experiences where it is not possible to be sure which or how many experiences they are referring to.

This gave a sample of 93 respondents.



At the time of booking 76% of respondents received information about the different units, 15% didn't and 9% received 'some'. (Question 12)

Of the 70 people who initially chose to deliver in an MLU 27 (38%) did so. 28 (40%) were advised to move to the CLU on risk grounds. The reasons behind the change in service for the remaining 15 (21%) are unclear.

Of the 43 people who changed from a MLU to a CLU delivery 19 (44%) moved unit after labour had commenced.



Respondents views and experiences of the current postnatal care system.

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
This gave a sample of 166 respondents. Of this sample 154 mothers (93%) stayed in hospital overnight after giving birth.


Views about availability and importance of in-patient postnatal care

Was the availability of in-patient postnatal care a consideration when deciding where to give birth? 150 122 32 10 2


